Appendix: Gender Mainstreaming in the VLR Process

Gender mainstreaming in the VLR process is possible through an inclusive and transformative approach that addresses gender disparities across all phases of the VLR process and beyond.

Gender mainstreaming in the VLR process enhances the validity and scope of findings from the VLR, enabling more accurate, informed decision-making that reflects the needs of all genders. Thereby, it ensures policy inclusivity, leading to more equitable and responsive local governance. By addressing gender-specific barriers, it helps empower women and marginalized genders, enhancing their participation in leadership and economic activities. Through involving diverse community stakeholders, including women's organisations, legitimacy and support for development plans is increased, fostering a more collaborative approach to local governance. As gender equality is central to achieving many SDGs, integrating gender into VLRs also accelerates progress across multiple global goals, such as health, education, city planning and economic development. Gender inclusivity not only delivers improvements for women and girls but tends to achieve broader social benefits, decreasing exclusion and enhancing basic infrastructure across society, in particular amongst marginalized communities.

Throughout this publication, gender mainstreaming into the VLR methodology has been explained through the five pillars - identifying gender gaps, inequalities and vulnerable groups; including the participation of women and women's organizations; design interventions that are adaptable to varying contexts; using indicators to measure the situation of women in comparison to men; and using inclusive language - with key moments throughout the process of particular importance. Specific actions for gender integration are highlighted below, along with tools to support implementation.

Her City Toolbox is UN-Habitat's digital platform to gender-transformative cities. It is a step-by-step guide to urban development from an intersectional perspective. It includes inclusive and participatory digital tools to create cities that work for all, based on gender mainstreaming of the urban development process. Formalization of Working Group

Data Analysis

Further materials and tools to support urban transformation beyond the VLR

The intention of the VLR is to inform the development of urban environments. After identifying gaps and requirements for gender transformative urban developments it is key that action is taken to enact change, delivering interventions and legislating policy change. Below are several tools which can be used by governments, authorities, and community groups to continue to move beyond the VLR process and enact inclusive and participatory urban programmes:

I Know Gender: A free online training programme developed by UN Women to discuss how gender equality and women's empowerment help integrate gender perspectives into specific policies. This is a virtual course composed of 17-modules to teach gender concepts and apply them across international contexts.

Our City Plans: A toolbox and step-by-step participatory and flexible methodology to guide local governments and other stakeholders in their urban planning processes. The aim is to achieve sustainable territorial development and contribute to the implementation of SDG 11 at the local level, through processes that promote spatial inclusion and build capacities among governments and urban stakeholders.

MyNeighbourhood - Evidence-based Methodology for Sustainable Urban Design: This publication serves as a comprehensive guide to Evidence-Based Urban Planning and Design, demonstrating how spatial analysis can inform urban planning and design decisions for sustainable urban transformation. It addresses the challenges many cities face in formulating policies and action plans due to limited resources, unreliable databases, and insufficient GIS capabilities, which hinder their ability to identify and address urban issues effectively. The methodology is framed around five key city objectives— Compact, Connected, Inclusive, Vibrant, and Resilient—ensuring an integrated approach that aligns with the New Urban Agenda and Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs). This document provides practical tools and examples of spatial analysis to help decision-makers understand, diagnose, and transform their cities through an evidence-based process.

Rapid Planning Studio (RPS): The RPS is a 12-week 'rapid' planning process aimed to quickly harness the knowledge of city stakeholders and identify actionable outcomes. It focuses on essential strategic elements to direct future development and investment to achieve sustainable outcomes. Based on UN Habitat principles for sustainability, it integrates three basic pillars of sustainable development: urban legislation, urban finance and economy, and urban planning and design.

The Spatial Development Spatial Framework Guidelines – Strategic Planning for Metropolitan and Regional Development: The Spatial Development Framework (SDF) is a methodology to support strategic decision-making of metropolitan, regional, subnational, national and transnational governments on where, what, why and how to prioritise investments to guide the spatial implementation of development policies and strategies. Under the leadership of concerned governmental institutions and with due consideration of local communities, the process is based on the adequate combination of two main methods, the Matrix of Functions (MoF) and the Strategic Investment Planning (SIP). This combination helps governments gain a deeper understanding of their territories to ensure investments where they have the most significant impact.
